



Subject: Annual Comprehensive Financial Report – Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2021

I am pleased to report that the College has successfully completed the Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) as of June 30, 2021 with zero significant deficiencies, material weaknesses, or findings related to the financial statements. Additionally, there were no repeat findings and no negative reportable issues to the Board in the auditors SAS 114 letter as presented.

The ACFR document is quite comprehensive so I will summarize several of the more important issues as reported by our auditors as it relates to the Colleges financial statements:

- Every community college in the State received an extension for filing the audits this year due to data retrieval issues at the State level. All related audit documents were all filed on time prior to March 31, 2022 deadline.
- Change in Net Position increased \$652,342 in 2021 compared to a negative \$1,995,358 in 2020. This represents a positive \$2,647,700 net change in the last year.
- As a result of the Governmental Account Standards Board (GASB) Statement 75 the College has to include on our financial statements a liability for Other Post Retirement Benefits (OPEB) of \$19,719,484 (p. 9); that represents the College portion for our retirees that the State subsidizes. The College has no control over this number and would only be an actual liability if the State went bankrupt and were unable to pay their expenses. Therefore, without GASB statement 75, the College Net position would have been a positive \$543,589 instead of (\$19,175,895).
- Single Audit the College did have six findings on pages 20 23. All Corrective Actions plans have already been implemented.
- The College received a Affirmed rating of A+ stable rating from S&P Global as of June 30, 2021. The last rating was back in 2017 when the College last issued General Obligation Bonds.

Please let me know if you have any specific questions regarding the OPEB liability or need further explanations on anything audit related.



The objective of the audit is the expression of an opinion on the financial statements. We will plan and perform the audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards for financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the audit requirements of Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance). Those standards require that we obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement whether caused by error or fraud, and that we report on the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards (as noted above), and on your compliance with laws and regulations and on its internal controls as required for a Single Audit. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. We, in our sole professional judgment, reserve the right to refuse to do any procedure or take any action that could be construed as making management decisions or assuming management responsibilities. In connection with performing the above other services, you agree to: assume all management responsibilities including making all management decisions; oversee the service by designating an individual, preferably within senior management, who possesses suitable skill, knowledge, and/or experience; evaluate the adequacy and results of the services performed; and accept responsibility for the results of the services.

BOND OFFERINGS

With respect to any official statements issued by the Client with which Crowe is not involved, the official statement should indicate that the auditor is not involved with the contents of such official statement. The disclosure should read as:

Insurances.

There was a large increase in health insurance usage by South Suburban College plan members during the past year. The increased usage was not unique to the college health insurance. It was experienced throughout the health insurance industry. Our premium quotes each year are based on a blend of our usage and industry trends. This year, our initial quote from Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) for health insurance was a 20% increase over our current premiums.

The Insurance Committee considered a quote from another carrier and several plan changes to reduce this increase. Ultimately, the Insurance Committee voted unanimously to recommend renewing health insurance with Blue Cross Blue Shield. Additionally, the Insurance Committee voted unanimously to recommend four changes to reduce the health insurance premiums. The Insurance Committee always considers how plan changes may adversely affect members. Even with the recommended changes, the plan benefits remain in line with national norms. Vista National also secured significant rate relief through negotiations with BCBS. Their efforts along with recommended plan changes will bring the average premium increase to 8.5%.

Changes:

- Increase individual copay/out of pocket for the BCBS PPO plans from \$1500/\$3000 to \$2000/\$4000. (2% premium savings to PPO plan members)
- Increase HMO ER copay from \$50 per visit to \$150 per visit. (0.4% premium savings to HMO plan members)
- Increase HMO copays from \$20 primary and \$30 specialist to \$30 primary and \$40 specialist. (1% savings to HMO plan members)
- Change dental carrier from Delta Dental to BCBS dental. With a 14% increase in dental premiums (BCBS has offered a 2% health insurance premium reduction to switch. This results in significant overall savings even with the dental premium increase.)

Recommendations:

The insurance committee recommends the following renewals, additions and changes of the following plans effective July 1, 2022:

- BCBS PPO, HSA, and HMO health insurance plans (with the changes outlined above)
- Tele-Med 1-800MD (No Change)
- BCBS dental (Change from Delta Dental)
- EyeMed Vison (No Change)
- Life Insurance AD&D Plans: BCBS (No Change)
- Retain Vista National

The Chief Financial Officer acts as custodian of the College's funds, serves as financial advisor to the President and the Board, seeks additional revenue sources, protects the assets of the College and keeps the Vice President and President apprised of the institution's financial condition. Manages and directs the activities of the Treasurer's Office and the department of Business and Accounting Services in a confidential and professional manner, ensuring accordance with all applicable laws and generally accepted accounting principles for all funds of the College. Monitors the financial information, and is a resource for College personnel in related financial and budgetary matters.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES include the following. Other duties may be assigned.

Responsible for articulating and cultivating a clear understanding across the College of financial conditions, trends, and alternative options; monitors and develops plans associated with the with major funding sources.

Serves as chief accounting officer in charge of the College's accounting books and records. Supervises the enforcement and maintenance of the classification of accounts and any other accounting rules and regulations that any regulatory agency may prescribe. Oversees the hiring, promotion, and/or termination of employees in the Business & Accounting Office and Treasurer's Office.

Develop and oversee financial policies, procedures, and internal controls to safeguard assets, protect confidential information, and ensure accurate financial reporting.

Strategically develop and administer the annual budget and multi-year forecasting process to align the College's goals and mission.

Directs and manages a variety of projects and tasks including, but not limited to, the day-to-day fiscal management and maintenance of monetary funds, financial records and reports, data base systems, and student accounts.

Oversee all aspects of independent audit process and other compliance audits.

Maintains close working relationship with financial institutions, internal revenue service, and other agencies or service providers, as well as personnel of the College engaged in related duties.

Secures financing (loans and/or bonds) for special projects to fund the various activities of the College and maintains required financial arrangements. Knowledge of debt maintenance.

Responsible for the annual tax levy including the receipts, entries and reporting of these funds.

Presents the monthly financial reports and other relevant financial information at monthly College Board meetings.

Represent the College at statewide CFO meetings and conferences and report trending news and initiatives to the President's Leadership Council and/or Board meetings as appropriate.

Invests the College's funds as required, prepares reports of these activities and establishes and coordinates policies to govern investments.
